I. Catalog Description

This course is an introduction and practice in the basics of Rodeo Skill. Since skills/proficiencies are enhanced by supervised repetition and practice, this course is repeatable to a maximum of three enrollments but can only be taken once per year. This course has been approved for online and hybrid delivery for emergency use only.

A. Course Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the proper use of equipment for each rodeo event.
- 2. Demonstrate proper safety procedure.
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of proper technique when performing each rodeo event (riding and roping).
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding in all aspects of rodeo events. This would include improved riding along with rules and regulations regarding the rodeo events.

B. Course Objectives:

Upon completion of each enrollment of this course the student will be able to progressively show increased abilities (beginning, intermediate, advanced levels) to:

- 1. Demonstrate proper usage of equipment in each rodeo event.
- 2. Perform rodeo tasks in a safe and humane manner.
- 3. Demonstrate individual skills in riding and roping.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of rules about each rodeo event.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of the technique of scoring the events.
- 6. Analyze rodeo situations and apply the correct adjustments.
