Administration of Justice/POST Program



Academic Year: 2023

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Executive Summary

The Administration of Justice Program has seen significant growth in student enrollments across all semester-length courses. In May 2020, the program created and filled an AJ and POST Program Director/Instructor position, changing the duties of the full-time faculty member to a 40% instructional and 60% Director load. This move has led to growth in course offerings, frequency of offerings, and student enrollment in POST and STC certified classes. In August 2023, the program added a full-time AJ instructor, which is expected to further boost enrollments, sessions, and courses.

A notable addition to the program is the AJ171 - CDCR Off-Post Training for Custody Staff. This course allows state Correctional Officers to become students at LCC, whereby making them eligible to obtain Credit for Prior Learning for their CDCR Correctional Academy. The course is offered once a week when the High Desert State Prison conducts its annual training. Since the course's inception in April 2023, over 100 students have enrolled, and more than 1600 units of free CPL credit has been granted. Several of these students have continued their education at LCC.

The program is working closely with are other law enforcement partners to identify, develop, and deliver courses that are relevant to their needs. Courses added this review period include:

- POST Firearms Instructor Course (AJ56)
- POST Supervisor's Course (AJ63)
- The creation CDCR to ACO Transfer class (AJ64)

The program plans to develop additional POST/STC course offerings, a High School Pathways Program, a baccalaureate degree, and potentially a "Modern Policing" degree.

The Administration of Justice (AJ) program has demonstrated a high success rate across various metrics. The program's Student Learning Outcomes (SLO) success rate for the review period was an impressive 98.56%, exceeding the SLO minimum success rate in every class. This high success rate is a testament to the quality of the program and the preparation it provides for students' future endeavors.

In terms of course success rates, the AJ program achieved 81% in 2021-22 and 91% in 2022-23, outperforming the college's collective success rates of 78% and 77% for the same periods. The AJ program also demonstrated strong retention rates of 93% and 94% for the same periods, again surpassing the college's collective retention rates of 89% for both periods.

The program also saw a slight growth in degree and certificate achievement year over year. In 2020-21, the program awarded eight degrees and two certificates, which increased to nine degrees and three certificates in 2021-22. This upward trend is expected to continue.

The Administration of Justice program, due to his rapid growth is still in need of additional resources to continue its upward trajectory. The condition and availability of classroom space are a high priorities. The program has dedicated space, but could use more for the addition of other POST classes as well as the expansion for Pathways and a Bachelor program.

Additional staffing needs will need to be considered in the future as well. Currently, the Director completes the majority of the clerical duties that would typically be assigned to administrative staff, taking time away from other duties. The program wishes to hire clerical/administrative staff in the future to free up the Director to focus more on program vision, planning, management, and growth. There is a great

need for a program specific webpage to advertise upcoming POST and STC certified courses. Agencies looking to send their staff to classes normally seek out this type of medium to locate the courses they need.

These achievements demonstrate the program's commitment to providing quality education and training to its students, as well as its efforts to continuously improve and expand its offerings for the success of the students as well as Lassen Community College.

SECTION 1: ACADEMIC PLANNING

Program Overview, Objectives, and Student Learning Outcomes

The Administration of Justice Program (AJ) and California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) programs at Lassen Community College (LCC) currently consists of twenty-four (24) individual courses and three (3) being developed. This is up from twenty-one (21) courses at last review. A student at LCC can earn an Associates of Science Degree for transfer, an Associates of Arts Degree, or a Certificate of Achievement in Administration of Justice. A student can also take individual courses as needed for personal or professional development.

The Administration of Justice Program is designed to prepare students for employment following graduation, or for transfer to a California State University or University of California offering an upper division major in Administration of Justice. Additionally, individual courses are designed to provide students with current industry knowledge and skills that can be effectively implemented within their professions.

The California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) and Community Corrections, Standards for Training in Corrections (STC) programs offers twelve (12) individual courses for professional development for peace officers, correctional officers, and probation officers, as well as any profession needing law enforcement training for their position. Many of these courses are dual certified for both POST and STC, and can be counted towards an AJ degree at LCC.

Objectives for the Administration of Justice Program:

As an Administration of Justice major, the student will:

- Study the history, philosophy and theories of crime; the structure of the criminal justice, courts and correctional systems; elements of community relations and current careers.
- Develop skills in criminal investigations and prosecution, community relations and communication.
- Identify an area of specialization in the administration of justice field.

Program Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the Associate in Science Degree in Administration of Justice for Transfer, the student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the workings of the criminal justice system by applying definitions, concepts, and principles to law enforcement, corrections, and the courts.
2. Apply critical thinking to research, evaluate, analyze and synthesize the appropriate procedures for the collection of evidence and data in criminal case preparation for law enforcement agencies.
3. Develop, organize and write an objective report that meets the legal and detailed requirements of law enforcement agencies.

Upon completion of the Associate in Arts Degree or the Certificate of Achievement in Administration of Justice the student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the workings of the criminal justice system by applying definitions, concepts, and principles to law enforcement, corrections and the courts.
2. Apply critical thinking to research, evaluate, analyze and synthesize the appropriate procedures for the collection of evidence and data in criminal case preparation for law enforcement agencies.
3. Develop, organize and write an objective report that meets the legal and detailed requirements of law enforcement agencies.
4. Be academically prepared to obtain an entry-level or midlevel position within the Criminal Justice System.

The Administration of Justice Program's mission and goals compliment Lassen Community College's Mission Statement and Strategic Goals. LCC established and published Mission Statement and Strategic Goals are as follows:

Mission

Lassen Community College provides educational programs for all pursuing higher education goals. The core programs offer a wide range of educational opportunities including transfer degrees and certificates, economic and workforce development, and basic skills instruction. The College serves diverse students, both on campus and in outreach areas in its effort to build intellectual growth, human perspective and economic potential.

Strategic Goals

1. Institutional Effectiveness: Provide the governance, leadership, integrated planning and accountability structures, and processes to effectively support an inclusive learning environment, while ensuring responsible stewardship of public trust and resources.
2. Learning Opportunities: Provide an array of rigorous academic programs delivered via a variety of modalities that promote student equity and learning while meeting the needs of the local and global community.
3. Resource Management: Manage human, physical, technological and financial resources to sustain fiscal stability and to effectively support the learning environment.
4. Student Success: Provide a college environment that reaches-out-to and supports students, minimizes barriers, and increases opportunity and success through access and retention to enable student attainment of educational goals including completion of degrees and certificates, transfer, job placement and advancement, improvement of basic skills, and self-development through lifelong learning.

Changes to the Program Since Last Review:

Since last review, the program has made the following changes:

- Added an additional full-time Administration of Justice Instructor in August 2023. This allows more classes and sections to be offered, thus helping the program grow.
- Created a non-credit course (AJ171 – Off POST Training for Correctional Officers) that is offered most Tuesday's at High Desert State Prison. This class was designed to allow CDCR Correctional Officer to sign up for this course, while they are attending their annual training. Once they become a LCC Student, and complete the needed paperwork, the AJ program is providing up to 16.5 units for Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) for their Correctional Academy. To date we have had over 100 enrollments in this course, and issued over 1600 units of CPL.
- Created a POST Firearms Instructor Course (AJ56). During this rating period, this course has been offered once, with eighteen (18) students in attendance. This course will be offered three to four times a year, as needed. This course brings law enforcement personnel from all over northern California.
- Created a POST certified Supervisor's Course (AJ63). This is a coveted course in the state. LCC was fortunate enough to be offered the opportunity to present this course. We are the only presenter north of Sacramento currently POST authorized to present this class. This two-week (80 hours) course was created and certified, however not offered within this rating period. It was first offered in August 2023, and the data will be included in the next IPR.
- Created CDCR to ACO Transfer class (AJ64). This is an 80-hour course allowing CDCR trained Correctional Officer to be certified to work on a county correctional facility. This is a STC certified course that has been certified, but not offered as of the end of this reporting period.
- Changed the course name of AJ9 from Introduction to Correctional Science to Introduction to Corrections, to align better with C-ID naming.
- Free Online Educational Resources added to AJ12 and AJ20, removing the costly textbook
- BUS22, Business Law, has been removed from this program's IPR reporting. Therefore, the reported numbers will only be on AJ specific courses.

Achievement

Based upon the above data, the program is seeing a slight growth in degree/certificate achievement, year over year, since the pandemic wreaked havoc on our numbers system-wide. In 2000-21, the program awarded eight (8) degrees, and two (2) certificates. 2021-22 saw a slight increase to nine (9) degrees, and three (3) certificated awarded. It is anticipated that these number will continue to rise moving forward.

The data shows that the course success rates for the AJ program were 81% in 2021-22, and 91% in 2022-23, while the college collectively was at 78% and 77% respectively. Further, the AJ program retention rate was 93% and 94% for the same time period, with the college collectively was 89% for both periods. This speaks highly of the quality of the program and instructors. We will continue to strive for improvement over previous years.

Equity

Based on your review of the data trends above (e.g., course success, retention) no equity gaps are revealed. All areas displayed above show high success rates amongst the groups listed. One area that shows a lower than desired rate of success and retention is 17 years old and younger. However, the data does not provide information on how many students attended classes in that age category. It is assumed that this may be related to the level of course work required to be successful in the AJ courses. We anticipate this will change significantly in the next review period as the program is expanding to offer Pathway's classes for our local high school students. We will continue to monitor this number and look for ways to improve, if needed.

Student Learning Outcomes

SLO assessment is important to maintain and improve an effective learning experience for LCC students. Evaluating SLO results regularly is helpful for evaluating student learning and identifying emerging program needs. There is a link between SLO assessment results, SLO improvement plans and review of curriculum and/or budget requests. Regular program assessment will drive program improvement. These records are maintained in the online Data Management and Visualization tool (TABLEAU) and are available for review by faculty at any time through its self-updating, interactive dashboards, and reports. Feedback and narrative from the Share Point tool will be included in the reports.

*By contract, faculty are required to prepare and submit an SLO Assessment Plan for each class within one week of the first-class meeting and implementation of the assessment method as indicated on the SLO Plan for each class. Submission of the (a) results of the assessment methods and (b) steps taken as result of the assessment within five (5) District business days after the last scheduled meeting of the class. Both submissions will be made in accordance with District tracking procedures (I.e., may be paper-based or electronic).

An analysis of the SLO data for the below referenced courses for this rating period showed all courses exceeding the SLO minimum success rate in every class, with a program SLO success rate of 98.56% for this review period. That is a statistic we are proud of. Our AJ students are being prepared well for their future endeavors, and the SLO's confirm that.

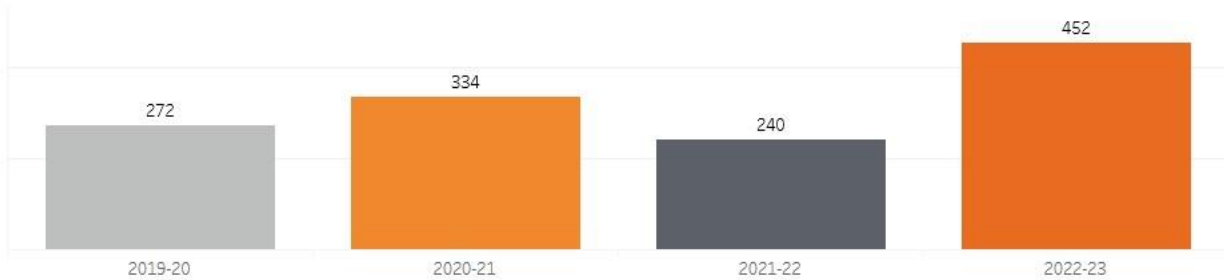

Based on your review of the data trends above it is very apparent that the AJ/POST program is on the rise! Overall enrollments increased by 212 from 2021-2022 to 2022-23, that is an 88% increase in enrollments, year over year. One of the reasons for such a large increase is the addition of AJ-171, with saw 100 enrollments in 2022-23. Even removing this number from the equation, the AJ/POST program saw a 46% increase. That growth was realized while that data shows an 5.6% overall decrease in college enrollment. The growth appears to be associated with the hard work and dedication of the full-time, and part-time faculty that strive to grow the program for the betterment of the students, regional law enforcement agencies, and this institution.

Further, a review of the FTEF statistics appears to indicate that the program in 2021-2022 was producing the equivalent of two full-time faculty members, while only have a director, who has a 40% teaching load, and multiple adjunct instructors. The program FTEF continued to grow in 2022-23 to 2.6, with the same number of faculty performing the task.

Courses

The program has seen considerable growth in courses in the area of professional development. Due to the regional in-service training needs of our criminal justice partners, we have added, or are adding at the time of this writing, a CDCR to ACO Transition course, a Firearms Instructor course, Tactical Rifle Instructor course, POST Law Enforcement Supervisory course, Juvenile Corrections Officer Core Class, Adult Corrections Officer Supplemental Course, and a non-credit CDCR Off-Post Training for Custody Staff course. All of these classes, with the exception of CDCR Off-Post Training for Custody Staff, are certified by either POST or STC and offered in an intensive format.

The course offerings in the program's AS-T and AA degrees are the same as previously indicated in prior evaluations. We have added Online educational Resources as the no cost textbook option in AJ12 and AJ20. They will be first implements in fall 2023, and we will report back next review on how that implementation went. We are seeing growth in student enrollments across the board in all of the semester length courses.

The addition of AJ171 - CDCR Off-Post Training for Custody Staff, was the collective vision of the program and other to see our state Correctional Officers obtain credit for prior learning for their CDCR Correctional Academy. This course, which is offered one day a week, when High Desert State Prison is in session with their annual training. We attend that training, enroll those staff attending who wish to sign up for the free, non-credit class, then offer them the CPL application for up to 16.5 units of free CPL credit for their CDCR Correctional Academy. Since inception of this vision is approximately April of 2023, we have enrolled over 100 students and granted over 1600 units of free CPL credit. Several of these students have continued on with their educational goals at LCC.

In May 2020, LCC created and filled an AJ and POST Program Director/Instructor position, and promoted the full-time faculty member to this position. Since the creation of this position, the POST program has seen growth in course offerings, frequency of offerings, and student enrollment in POST and STC certified classes. IN August of 2023, the program was able to add an additional full-time AJ instructor. That instructor is carrying a full load for the fall 2023 semester, as we expect to see additional growth in enrollments, sessions, and courses as a result of her being added to the team.

There is a need for additional peace officer in-service type training offerings in our area, and we are working closely with our law enforcement partners to identify, develop, and instruct those courses.

All courses offered in the Administration of Justice/POST program have undergone extensive review for accuracy and currency. In this process, the textbooks and content were updated, where needed, to the current information available. All courses in the program were reviewed for modality of delivery. With the exception of POST approved courses that do not allow distance learning as an option, all appropriate AJ courses have hybrid and online delivery added as a modality.

This articulation report above show that program courses are well articulated to the CSU and UC systems. The program has articulated a total of five (5) courses for General Education credit towards a terminal AA degree, and three (3) courses forwards CSU GE credit.

C-ID, the Course Identification Numbering System, is a faculty-driven system developed to assign identifying designations (C-ID numbers) to transfer courses. Most C-ID numbers identify lower-division transferable courses commonly articulated between the California Community Colleges and CSUs and UCs. It provides information for students, staff, and faculty who must identify which community college courses best meet the expectations transfer partners have for courses that contribute to transfer into a major at specific universities. Any community college that bears the C-ID number conveys intersegmental faculty has determined it meets the published course content, rigor, and course objectives. The C-ID descriptor also means that any other course elsewhere; bearing the same number will be accepted by the institution.

Lassen Community College has the following AJ courses approved by C-ID:

AJ 5 Introduction to Forensics; **AJ 8** Criminal Court Process; **AJ 9** Introduction to Corrections; **AJ 12** Introduction to Criminal Justice; **AJ 14** Juvenile Procedures; **AJ 20** Criminal Law; **AJ 23** Criminal Evidence; **AJ 24** Community Relations; and, **AJ 35** Investigative Techniques

External Compliance

Several of the courses in the program have to comply with the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) and/or the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), Standards and Training for Corrections (STC) regulations. This requires the courses, curriculum, hourly distribution of instruction, course instructor resumes, location of instruction, and safety policies (in some cases), to be reviewed and approved before LCC can offer or the course. Further, POST and STC require a two-year review and revision of the material. To provide POST and/or STC training certification for students, the program is required to complete a myriad of clerical type tasks for proper certification. All of the aforementioned tasks, and compliance work, is currently handled by the POST Director. There are no POST or STC compliance issues at this time.

Further, the AJ/POST Director maintains the POST certification of the Gunsmithing Program's five (5) Armorer's courses that are offered in the summer. These course have to go through the same rigorous approval process as listed above. The POST Director completes all of the clerical duties to maintain and continue certification of these course offerings.

With the addition of the several aforementioned POST and STC courses over the past few years, the regulatory and clerical responsibilities have greatly increased. The process in time consuming and laborious.

It should be noted that the California Legislature has passed a bill (AB89) requiring POST and the Community College Chancellor's office to work together to provide a recommendation for a new 'Modern Policing' degree for entry level law enforcement officers. Depending on the outcome of this recommendation and future legislation, LCC may consider updating our current degrees or developing another degree to comply with this law. Additional research and time will be needed to determine our best path moving forward.

External Analysis: Job Market Assessment

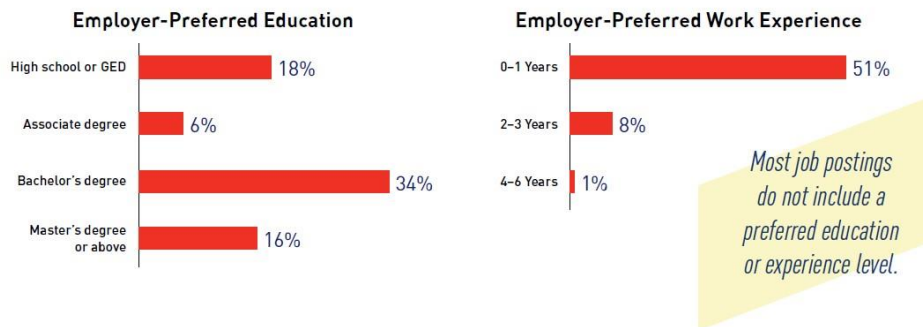
A review of the minutes will show that the committee members discussed and approved the Administration of Justice and POST courses. In addition, they discussed the need for specific POST and/or STC classes and the need to offer these courses through the college rather than sending people out of the area to train. Some course options included Firearms and Rifle Instructor courses, SWAT tactical type courses, Impact Weapons, and other law enforcement in-service type courses.

The committee was in consensus that the program, due to its growth, will likely need additional support staff and faculty in the near future.

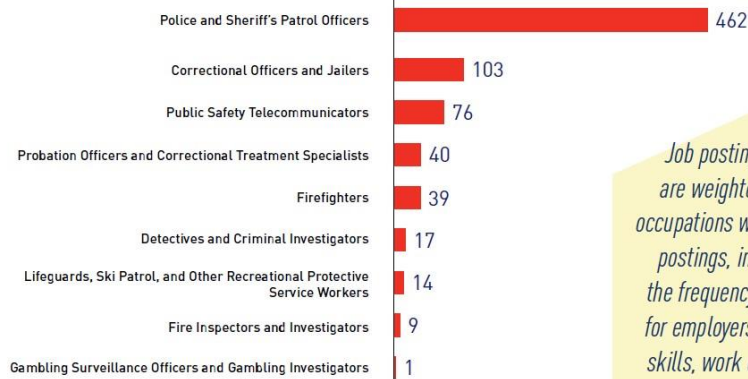
Labor Market Index data has been received from North Far North. This data shows a statewide growth in Law Enforcement and Corrections employment. See graphs below.

Program Planning and Communication Strategies

The AJ/POST department is in a continuous cycle of program level planning, the AJ/POST director communicates regularly with the Deans and V.P. of Instruction. Current program planning includes the maintenance and improvement of all current course offerings for the AJ, POST, and STC programs. Program level planning, curriculum, SLOs, PSLOs, equity, student achievement and performance data are discussed among full-faculty and recommendations, when warranted, are presented to the Dean of Instruction for review. The AJ/POST Director is the current Curriculum Co-Chair, as well as the Vice-Chair of Academic Senate. The newly hired full-time AJ Instructor is also on the Curriculum Committee.

Academic Planning Analysis Summary

The AJ/POST program has experienced good success over the past few years, as displayed throughout this report and the statistics provided. The full-time and adjunct faculty have worked together to identify the following priority areas for growth:

1. Increase enrollment in current course offerings through outreach and advertising.
2. Increase enrollment through creating Pathway's course offerings.
3. Investigate and develop additional course to meet our regional law enforcement partner's needs.
4. Investigate the opportunity to develop and offer a Bachelorette degree.

The AJ/POST program has seen transition over the past few years. Prior to August 2023, There was one (1) full-time faculty member assigned to the Administration of Justice/POST Department. However, this faculty member was also the program’s Director splitting the time 60 to AJ/POST Director duties and 40% to the AJ instructor role. The remainder of the instructional load had been carried by several adjunct instructors. The program is allocated a 50% Instructional Support Specialist. This position has been vacant for a good portion of this review period. No other instructional assistants or classified staff are assigned to internally support the program’s activities.

The college administration and governing board has added an additional full-time AJ instructor to the program, starting August 2023. That additional faculty member will be an integral part of the continued success and growth of the program. That support by the administration and governing board is much appreciated.

With the addition of the above mentioned courses, along with more sections being offered of current courses, increased student enrollment, along with the planned addition of a Pathways program for the area high schools, and potential baccalaureate degree, the program is still in need of additional faculty and support staff.

Last year, the program supported 2.6 full-time faculty member (FTEF). This with just one full-time employee with a 40% faculty load and several adjunct instructors. The full-time faculty is normally taking overload to have program success. The POST and STC program, where we see the most growth, required classes to be in an intensive, seminar type modality, requiring intensive faculty time and engagement. These type of courses need multiple instructors and subject matter experts to teach the course content, along with a great deal of administrative support. Some of this support includes

producing student handouts, setting up instructional material and equipment, additional support staff in the classroom environment, proctoring of certain testing, maintenance and service of equipment, etc. Currently the only full-time AJ Instructor/Director and part-time adjunct instructors are carrying the load.

The program statistics, along with planned growth, necessitate the addition of support and faculty staff at some point to continue the upward trajectory.

Professional Development

The current AJ/POST Director/Instructor is currently the Co-Chair of the Curriculum Committee, a Senator on the Academic Senate, The CTE/PE Division Chair and chief negotiator for the Lassen College Faculty Association (LCFA). The newly hired AJ faculty member is a member and active participant on the Curriculum Committee.

Ongoing professional development through flex activities on campus, as well as attending online instructor development course were completed this evaluation cycle. Additionally, full-time instructors attended POST certified instructor level courses to increase their skills this evaluation period. Adjunct instructors in this program are mostly current full-time law enforcement professionals who maintain relevancy and currency in their professions.

For POST and STC program growth, there is a need to send faculty to POST and STC certified instructor schools, so they then can teach on the specific course of instructions under POST/STC guidelines. There is a need for certified instructors in firearms training, First Aid/CPR, drivers training, de-escalation, defensive tactics, and instructor/facilitator development. Further, the field of criminal justice is ever changing and there is a need to have instructors maintain their currency and relevancy of information. Therefore, instructors should continue to attend courses, seminars, and conferences to stay abreast of the changing career field.

Section 3: Infrastructure Planning

Facilities

The two classrooms in Building M are equipped with teaching technologies such as large screen smart televisions, laptop docking stations, DVD player, and various devices in all classes used by the Department. In 2021, the AJ department was assigned the majority of Building M for classroom, office, and storage space for program use and instruction. The POST classes are required to be offered in an intensive, seminar style mode of instruction where classroom space is needed for several hours and for several days at a time. This space has afforded the opportunity to offer more POST and STC classes, without impacting other LCC semester based classes and classrooms. On occasion, the classrooms in Building M are shared with the Fire Science program, assisting their program with classroom space as needed.

There are times that the two classrooms allocated to the program are not enough. We then either have to limit our simultaneous course offerings, or request additional classroom space on campus. Due to the nature of our class and the other instructional needs of the campus, that request is often difficult to fulfill. The POST/AJ program is in need for additional, dedicated, classroom space to be used for the continued growth of the program. It is suggested that the institution make available the remainder of the M building for this use.

The M building is at the back of the campus and is not clearly marked for visitors to locate. The program brings in several out of the area agencies to attend our POST and STC level courses. It is recommended that funds be made available to better identify the facility to those attending courses. One suggestion is a professionally created sign that is installed near the driveway to the M and N building, identifying them as the "Public Safety Training Center".

The building has two restrooms. These restrooms are convenient and functional. However, they are in poor shape due to their age. Both of them are in desperate need of remodeling and updating. The POST and STC program students come from all over the north state of California to attend. The lack of regular upkeep could give a negative impression of the program and the college as a whole.

Lastly, Building M, which is used for defensive tactics and physical training, and other physically exerting activities, has no drinking water facilities. The need for the availability of drinking water during these physical type classes is imperative

Equipment

Existing equipment within in the program is sufficient for current program needs. However, the growth of the program necessitates the addition of more specialized, course specific, items. These needs are being purchased with program grant funds at this time.

Technology

The program's current 15 laptop computers that are used for online testing required for some of our POST certified courses are outdated and becoming problematic. Due to the advancement in technology, and the life expectancy of lap top computers, it is recommended that the 10 laptops that are over 9 years old be replaced in the next budget cycle.

Currently, adjunct faculty are unable to print documents to the LCC printers/copies from their personal laptops without saving the document to a flash drive or emailing a full-time faculty member with the file. This is apparently due to non-district devices not being allowed on the District's network. This is arduous and time consuming. Therefore, it is recommended that the District purchase an additional laptop computer for the sole use of the adjunct instructors in the AJ program.

Section 4: Program Planning

Progress Update on Previous Action Plans:

The previous IPR from 2021 included numerous planning agenda items that involved program faculty prioritization and implementation. Items completed included hiring a 50% ISS for the program (although currently vacant), creating and hiring a full-time AJ Instructor, painting the outside of the M building, creating additional POST and/or STC certified courses based upon law enforcement needs, and making facility upgrades to Sierra Sportsmen’s Club range for college use.

Items listed from the prior IPR that were not completed, and continue to be needs include the following:

1. Develop and offer additional courses in the POST program to effectively meet the ongoing needs in law enforcement, corrections and probation officers.
2. A POST and STC program specific webpage is needed.
3. Replace Dell laptops used for PC832 testing, as they are (now) 9 years old
4. Purchase and issue the AJ department 1 laptop to be used by adjunct faculty.
5. Allocate resources to send faculty to POST certified instructor or instructor development courses
6. Secure additional space for instruction for future growth
7. Install drinking/water bottle fountain in building M

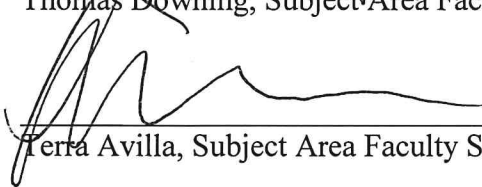

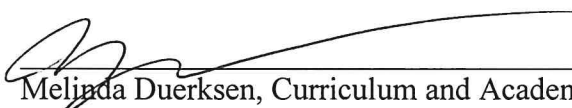

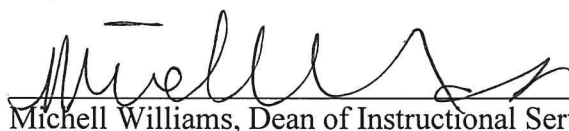
