AJ-55 Tactical Rifle Instructor

1.5 Units

I. Catalog Description

This course is designed to prepare experienced law enforcement personnel to teach Tactical Rifle courses at the basic and in-service level. Topics include the role of the law enforcement rifle instructor, liability issues, instructor development, lesson plan preparation, basic marksmanship, shooter problem analysis, standard and non-traditional shooting positions, weapons transition, and tactical movement and cover. This course meets the minimum instructor certification requirements to be a POST Tactical Rifle instructor. This course assumes the student is proficient in the use of the designated weapons systems, as basic operator skills will not be taught. Due to current California Law, enrollment limited to current California peace officers who are sponsored by their agency. Course instructor signature required for enrollment. Material fees of \$25.00 per student collected at time of registration.

Recommended Preparation: Successful completion of ENGL105 or equivalent multiple measures placement.

- 2. Design and instruct a tactical rifle shooting course for law enforcement personnel.

- 1. Identify range safety rules and apply the rules by directing and controlling students which are involved in a live fire range scenarios ensuring the safety of all persons.
- 2. Evaluate a trainee's technique of shooting with movement, shooting on the move, and close quarters combat.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to communicate to students the expected tactics to be used by the students in a given live fire scenario.

- 4. Demonstrate the ability to evaluate a student on compliance of the expected outcomes giving the student verbal feedback and further instruction if needed.
- 5. Develop a lesson plan with a course of fire which includes scenarios to address a known rifle related deficiency.

F. Written, Oral and/or Demonstration Assessments

Instructors will provide assessment and feedback on presentations. Prior to the student's presentation, instructors will meet with each student to review their ECO, Lesson Plan and Courses of Fire to ensure they are properly formatted and that the instruction flows properly.

Once the student completes their presentation, time will be spent evaluating the students' performance and reviewing other course-of-fire options. Fellow students will provide feedback on the students presentation.

Students are required to complete appropriate reading assignments as determined by the instructor. Student will receive hands-on instruction on the takedown and cleaning of rifles Student will accomplish same under the supervision of their instructor.

B. Writing Assignments

Student will research, develop, and deliver a POST expanded course outline and lesson plan, which will be reviewed and evaluated by a course Instructor.

C. Expected Outside Assignments

At the shooting range, student will apply learned knowledge of firearms and safety to the proper firing of their firearms. Upon completing the course of fire, and while still under the instructor's supervision, student will safely clear and clean their firearm.

D. Specific Assignments that Demonstrate Critical Thinking At the shooting range, student will apply learned knowledge of firearms and safety to the proper firing of their firearms, and teach back those skills in a controlled enviroment.

VI. Methods of Evaluation

A written, teach back exercise, a pre-instruction and post instruction firearms skills test which requires the student to demonstrate basic handgun safety and shooting principles will be given. Students must pass all exercise and tests to receive certification.
