AJ-65 Adult Corrections Officer Supplemental Core Course

4 Units

I. Catalog Description

This course (Supplemental to the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Basic Academy) is designed for the adult corrections peace officer who has successfully completed the POST Basic Academy Course for law enforcement officers; completes this course after the POST Basic Academy; is employed primarily as a peace officer as defined in Penal Code Section 830.1; and, has been assigned by the administrator of a local corrections agency to perform the job responsibilities of an adult corrections officer. Course instructor signature required for enrollment. Material fees of \$50.00 per student collected at time of registration.

Prerequisites: Must be 18 years of age and have High School Diploma or GED; California Basic Law Enforcement Academy

III. Course Objectives

A. Course Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify and demonstrate the major tasks and responsibilities of an adult correctional officer in a detention facility.
- 2. Identify and describe the overall mission of the adult correctional officer and its place in the California criminal justice system.

- 4. Given a scenario, identify a situation where a duty to inform exists.
- 5. Identify typical classification issues related to gang membership.

- 6. Identify types of offender behaviors that can be prevented or mitigated through effective interpersonal communication.
- 7. Identify the purpose of a sally port.
- 8. Identify procedures for doing a numerical count.
- 9. Identify the primary considerations for conducting facility searches.
- 10. Identify security issues with offenders using an unauthorized telephone.
- 11. Identify requirements regarding the medical screening of incoming offenders, according to Title 15.
- 12. Identify the procedure for orienting incoming offenders, according to Title 15.
- 13. Identify the different types of releases.
- 14. Identify indicators that a staff member is being victimized.
- 15. Identify signs of potential disturbances.
- 16. Identify issues that may arise when supervising bathroom facilities and showers.
- 17. Identify Title 15 directives and case law relevant to offender exercise, recreation, fresh air and natural light exposure.
- 18. Identify requirements relating to cleanliness of cells or dorms, according to Title 15.
- 19. Define the key principles that underlie the use of progressive discipline.
- 20. Given a group activity, identify typical group dynamic issues.
- 21. Identify safety and security concerns when escorting offenders to and from locations within the facility.
- 22. Identify ability requirements and restrictions related to specific duty assignments (e.g., physical, mental, learning, etc.
- 23. Match symptoms with common medical conditions.
- 24. Identify circumstances where medical treatment cannot be refused.
- 25. Describe the purpose and intent of classification.
- 26. Identify special considerations related to gender identity issues (e.g., searches, urine testing, housing, etc.).
- 27. Identify the types of emergency situations that may occur in a detention/correction facility.
- 28. Define the term "privileged communication".
- 29. Define legal mail according to Title 15.
- 30. Identify the procedure for verifying the identity of an offender prior to transport.
- 31. Define evidence-based practices and why they are important.
- 32. Define zero tolerance as it applies to sexual assault, abuse and harassment.
- 33. Identify barriers to completing pat-down and/or strip searches.
- 34. Identify situations when the use of restraint devices may be appropriate, according to Title 15.
- 35. Identify key considerations that must be addressed in planning cell extractions.
- 36. Recognize recent trends in substance abuse.
- 37. Recognize signs and symptoms of those affected by trauma.
- 38. Recognize verbal de-escalation techniques through scenarios.
- 39. Identify Title 15 mandates that refer to the psychological treatment of offenders.
- 40. Identify the mandates around access to MHBI services.
- 41. Recognize high risk behaviors associated with suicide.
- 42. Identify common Behavioral Health terminology.
- 43. Recognize the potential consequences of improper monitoring of MHBI offenders.
- 44. Define signs of secondary and vicarious trauma (as it relates to staff).
